The Redcliffe Wharf urban beach in the summer of 2007 created a new temporary city centre place where people who might otherwise never meet, congregated. muf used the beach as a catalyst and as a real place to explore what it takes to make seemingly exclusive cultural or social territories permeable to one another. Those territories were identified as the particular history of a place, exemplified through the work of Thomas Chatterton and the culture of local children and young people. The project began with a lecture as cook out as part of the

Project methodology: The workshops were devised by muf through dialogue with the Chatterton Society and the commissioned poet, Kev. The workshops established a relationship with a core group of eight young people from WUF through four sessions on the beach, four at the youth club and one at St Mary Redcliffe Church. The WUF children together with a further 50 participants produced poems, texts and images inspired by the work of Chatterton. These formed the basis for the final work that used a real journey around the harbour as a metaphor for those journeys of the imagination and the journey from childhood into the adult world

The role of the artist: The project enabled creative experiences between the artist and the participants and resolved these as a final art work. The artists worked intuitively and were reflexive to the social and cultural situation. To deliver the project and respond meaningfully, the artists undertook the following roles, each appropriate to the different stages of the project; artist as project manager.

artist as project manager artist as mentor

artist as teacher and skill sharer
artist as autonomous and intuitive creative

The final work was a promenade performance around the floating harbour to demonstrate how the places where we live are as much made by the ideas we have of them as they are by the real stuff around us, conversely, to make the world that we want is to turn our imagination into real things.
